Museum Quarter, Old Town, Hull, HU1 1TJ (10.8 Miles)

Journey back 235 million years at the Museums Quarter in Hull's Old Town to encounter sea monsters, Romans and a life-sized woolly mammoth at the Hull and East Riding Museum of Archaeology.

Street life Museum of Transport brings history to life with all the sights, sounds and smells of the past. The authentic scenes invite you to climb on, get in and explore. Visit the birthplace of William Wilberforce and find out about the transatlantic slave trade in Wilberforce House, re-opened in 2007 following a $\pounds 1.6$ million redevelopment. Maritime Museum, Queen Victoria Square, Hull, HU1 3DX (11 Miles)

These nautical themed offices were designed by Christopher G Wray and originally opened in 1871. Now they display Hull's maritime activities from the late 18th century to present. Discover the whaler's craft of Scrimshaw and see a full-sized whale skeleton, alongside superb ship models and stunning artefacts from Hull's whaling, fishing and merchant trade.

Burton Agnes Hall, Driffield, YO25 4NB (29 Miles)

Built between 1598 and 1610 by Sir Henry Griffith, Burton Agnes Hall is an Elizabethan stately home. Fifteen generations have filled the Hall with treasures, from magnificent carvings commissioned when the Hall was built to French Impressionist paintings, contemporary furniture, tapestries and other modern artwork in recent years.

Flamborough Head, Flamborough, YO15 1AR (38 Miles)

Flamborough Head is one of the most spectacular areas of chalk cliffs in Britain, standing 400 feet high. The chalk was laid down millions of years ago when the last dinosaurs were roaming the earth. The cliffs are home to one of the largest sites of nesting sea birds in England, boasting a rare colony of gannets. The cliff top walk is a bird spotter's paradise, and visitors to the headland include oyster catchers, gulls, eider ducks, and cormorants. There's also a wide variety of plant and wildlife species.

Skipsea Castle, Beeford Rd, Skipsea Brough, Driffield <u>YO25 8TH</u> (23 Miles) Skipsea Castle was a <u>Norman motte and bailey</u> castle near the village of <u>Skipsea</u>.. Built around 1086 by <u>Drogo de la Beuvrière</u>, apparently on the remains of an <u>Iron Age</u> mound, it was designed to secure the newly conquered region, defend against any potential North Sea Invasion.





Eden Camp, Malton, YO17 6RT (38 Miles)

Housed within the buildings and grounds of a former Prisoner of War camp, a visit to this unique museum will take you back to wartime Britain. Experience the sights, sounds and even smells of life on both the Home Front and the Front Line.

Sewerby Hall & Gardens, Church Lane, Sewerby, <u>YO15 1EA</u> (35 Miles) Situated in a dramatic cliff top position, Sewerby Hall & Gardens are set in 50 acres of early 19th Century parkland and enjoys spectacular views over Bridlington Bay. Open all year round the Estate is home to award winning pleasure and walled gardens, pitch & putt golf course, putting green, a

Burnby Hall Gardens & Museum, Pocklington, YO42 2QF (18 Miles)

Home to a National Collection of Hardy Water Lilies, which bloom on the two lakes between June and August. The lakes contain Carp and Roach that can be hand fed, are set in nine acres of woodland and gardens. The Stewart Museum houses artefacts which belonged to Major Percy Stewart, an adventurer and traveller, who lived at Burnby Hall between 1901 and 1962. Bridlington North Beach, Limekiln Ln, Bridlington YO15 2LY (32 Miles)

An excellent sand and shingle beach with an attractive promenade and great views of the impressive chalk cliffs of Flamborough Headland. The cliffs are a nesting site for thousands of sea birds and the only mainland nesting site for the Gannet in the UK. Rock pools, a land train and a range of traditional seaside activities make this a popular family beach.

Hornsea Beach, Hornsea, HU18 1PZ (21 Miles)

Hornsea is a classic seaside resort with an extensive sand and shingle beach. A long promenade with newly-landscaped gardens, old wooden breakwaters, plenty of parking and easy access to town facilities.





Withernsea, <u>HU19 2DW</u> (27.5 Miles)

The main beach at Withernsea is part of a strip of sand and shingle that runs for miles in both directions. An attractively redeveloped promenade features numerous cafes, fish and chip shops and pubs. Sailing and windsurfing are both popular activities.

Fraisthorpe, Nr Bridlington, YO15 3QU (28 Miles)

Fraisthorpe is a flat, sandy beach in the East Riding area of Yorkshire. It forms part of Bridlington Bay, a sandy stretch of coastline that stretches on for many miles southwards, down to the Humber Estuary. This makes the beach perfect for walking, with dogs allowed all year round. It is also a good beach for horse riding, particularly in the quieter months of the year.

Bempton Cliffs RSPB Reserve, Cliff Lane, Bempton, <u>YO15 1JF</u> (37 Miles) The Bempton Cliffs reserve, on the spectacular Yorkshire coast, is home to one of the UK's top wildlife spectacles. Around half a million seabirds gather here between March and October to raise a family on towering chalk cliffs which overlook the North Sea. Visitor Centre, Shop, Toilets, Nature Trail and Cliff Top Walks are sited here.

Blacktoft Sands RSPB Nature Reserve, Nr Ousefleet, <u>**DN14 8HR</u> (30 Miles)** You'll find Blacktoft Sands hiding on the south bank of the River Ouse, where the waterway widens to become the Humber Estuary. This magical reserve hosts a diverse population of waders, warblers and raptors, which can be easily spotted from the accessible trails and hides. Far Ings National Nature Reserve, Barton-on-Humber, DN18 5RG (9 Miles) Far Ings is situated on the south bank of the Humber Estuary, a major eastwest flyway for migrating birds. The sight and sound of a skein of geese flying over is spectacular. The pits and reedbeds at Far Ings and along the Humber bank are a legacy of the tile and cement industry which flourished between 1850 and 1959. The reserve is now rich in wildlife and one of the UK strongholds for bittern. Visit <u>www.lincstrust.org.uk</u> for more detail.

Yorkshire Wolds Way- Starts 400m from Raywell

There is direct access to the Wolds Way from Raywell Lodge Park within 400m. Discover 79 miles of stunning countryside that has captured the hearts of walkers, throughout history. Take your time walking along the banks of the River Humber or through the valleys and rolling hills of the Wolds. Visit **Reception** for more details.





Beverley 20- Starts at the Humber Bridge

This popular route is a 20 mile walk between the Humber Bridge and Beverley Minster. Enjoy the rustic beaches of the Hessle Foreshore as you head west along the riverside, before heading up the hill into the woodland of the quaint Yorkshire villages of North Ferriby and Welton. You'll cover sections of the Wold Way as you head up towards Skidby and Beverley.

The Ale Trail, Old Town, Hull, HU1 (11 Miles)

The Ale Trail takes you to some of the oldest pubs in the city which include George Hotel - Hull's oldest surviving licensed pub with the smallest window in England, Ye Olde Black Boy - Hull's oldest pub dating from 1337 and Ye Olde White Harte - Hull's most historic pub, allegedly where the Civil War started in 1642. Seven Seas Fish Trail- City Centre, Hull (11 Miles)

Follow Hull's unique pavement of fish, an A-Z of fish creating a tour of the historic Old Town. 41 pieces of sculpture made from traditional materials make up this impressive piece of public art. The artist Gordon Young created the trail of sculptures in 1992 - representing the actual size of fish with life size pieces, from a tiny anchovy to a 10ft ray.
